



GOTRIANGLE SERVICE

Continuation of improvements funded by Durham County Transit Plan taxes:

- Routes 400, 700, and 800:
 - o 30 Minute mid-day service
 - 30 Minute Saturday service
 - Sunday service
- Durham-Raleigh Express:
 - Increased number of peak trips
- New Orange-Durham Express







GODURHAM HIGHLIGHTS



- 17 routes serving over 1,000 stops
- 45 buses and 41 paratransit vehicles used in peak service
- 21,500 passenger trips per weekday
- **23 million miles traveled (FY17)** Average trip length: 3.6 miles (FY17)
- Transit operating* expenses: \$29 million
 - City of Durham: \$16 million
 - County Transit Plan taxes: \$3 million
 - Fed/state/farebox: \$10 million






GOTRIANGLE REGIONAL TRANSIT AGENCY PEERS







A COMMUNITY INVESTMENT IN TRANSIT

- 140,000 workers *live* in Durham County
- The top 4 places they work are:
 - 1. Duke University & VA Medical Center area
 - 2. Downtown Durham
 - 3. UNC and the Chapel Hill & Carrboro downtowns
 - 4. RTP area (Durham/Wake)


• More Durham residents work in Durham County than any other county:

- Between 1/3 and 1/2 of Durham residents work for employers outside of Durham County.
- Wake County and Orange County are the next two largest employment destinations for Durham residents.

• Regional connections are growing in importance for Durham workers:

From 2010 to 2017, the number of people who both live and work in Durham
County grew 15%, but Durham workers with jobs in other counties grew 25%.

WHERE PEOPLE WHO WORK IN DURHAM LIVE




- 200,000 jobs are located within Durham County
- Regional connections are growing in importance for Durham employers:
 - 25,000 new jobs in Durham County since 2010.
 - Around one-third of jobs in Durham County are held by Durham County residents, a rate that has remained steady since 2010.




CONNECTIONS BETWEEN WHERE TRANSIT RIDERS LIVE AND WORK (2014)





AS CONGESTION GROWS, RELIABILITY DECLINES






